SYST 221 SYSTEMS MODELING LABORATORY

Course Description: This course introduces students to fundamental principles of computer modeling using an engineering modeling environment such as MATLAB® and Simulink. Students will learn how to develop computer solutions to solve and interpret mathematical models. Problems from topics covered in Dynamical Systems I (SYST 220) will be taken up for class examples and lab assignments. Throughout the course we will discuss different features and capabilities of the MATLAB® software. Each lecture will be followed by working on exercises involving concepts covered that day.


Expected Behavior

Matlab 2013a is installed on the computers in the classroom, our open lab (ENGR 1506) and on the campus virtual computing lab (http://www.vcl.gmu.edu). Matlab is also installed on our Linux server which is accessible from off campus, but that would require the students to know how to install and use an X-server.

Assignments

There will be assignments posted on Blackboard every week. Each assignment will have its respective due date clearly mentioned on the assignment. I might sometimes not grade the assignments in detail, but will always use it to gain insight on how well students understand the subject.

You are not prevented to work with your peers on the class work exercises, and are even encouraged to do so. However, each student must provide his/her own answers, and I might verify whether he/she actually worked in his/her respective exercise and understood the solution provided. In any case, past experience consistently shows that students who didn't keep up with the assignments have had a hard time in the exams.

Assignments <u>must be submitted via Blackboard</u> and can be of three types:

Homework Assignment: Each homework assignment is out of 10 points. Unless stated otherwise, I will present the solutions at the beginning of the next class after the assignment was due. For this spring 2014 semester this usually means I post it on Thursday classes and present the solutions on the Tuesday class following the assignment. If you submit your assignment after it is due but before I present the solutions you can earn a max of 7 points. An assignment submitted after the solutions are posted will earn no points.

Classwork Assignment: Each classwork assignment is out of 5 points and it is due by the end of the class. I will post the solutions usually on the same day.

Tests, Quizzes, or Challenges: These are conducted in class and each will be out for an amount of points to be disclosed prior to the class. The details of each test, quiz, or challenge will be explained during its respective announcement.

Files should be named with the following convention:

Examples: Syst221 Hwk02 DoeJohn, Syst221 CW02 PoppinsMary, etc.
